
## Let's Play a Ballgame!

Once upon a time, there was a very popular sport in Central America. Nobody knows who came up with this sport more than 3,000 years ago. But everybody agrees that it was the Olmecs who made it popular. Even after the Olmecs were gone, the sport survived. The Mayas continued to play it. And so did the Aztecs.



Even now, we do not know the exact rules of the game. We do, however, know that people played the game differently in different places at different

times. If we want to bring back the sport, we need to have two teams of players standing on each end of an I-shaped court. When the game begins, the two teams need to pass a ball from one side of the court to the other. The players cannot touch the ball with their hands and feet. They can, however, use their hips, elbows, or knees to hit it. If a player does not pick up the ball in time and lets it fall to the ground, that team loses a point. Or if a player manages to direct the ball through a hoop, that team scores a point. The team with the most points wins the game.

Does this sport sound familiar to you?

If you think this reminds you of both volleyball and basketball, you are certainly on the right track. You can say that the ballgame people in Central America played was a cross between these two modern sports.

Like any sport, the players of this ballgame were very serious when they were on a court. And they had two very good reasons for it.

One, the ball they used for the sport was made out of rubber. It was very bouncy. And it was quite heavy. (It weighed at least 6 pounds.) If a player missed a shot and was hit by the ball, he could get hurt or even killed! To protect themselves, the players put on helmets and wore padding on their arms, legs, and hips. But even if they managed to stay safe throughout a game, they might still lose their lives. That led to the second reason why the players never took the sport lightly.

Back in those days, people in Central America looked at their ballgame as a form of struggle between darkness and light, or between good and evil. After it was over, they would perform a religious ritual by killing the players of the losing team and offering them to the gods. They might even put one of the skulls at the core of a new ball they were making!

As violent as the sport was, people in Central America really enjoyed it! On a game day, they crowded over the court to watch it. While the game was in progress, they ate and drank just as we do today. One of their favorite snacks was a chocolate drink made from cacao beans. Once the game ended, some went home happy. Some became quite upset. Most likely, they were distressed because they had bet on the wrong team. If the stakes were




